COCTYC EXECUTIVE MEETING 104TH CONFERENCE HOLIDAY INN, IRVING, TEXAS THURSDAY, APRIL 6, 1989

Members present: Jay Bardole, Edith Bartley, Ralph Burns, John Clevenger, Dick Gaglione, Elliott Greenberg, Leo Kling, Michael Knoll, Duane Sell, and Katherine Weissmann

Guests present: Weldon Burnham (Program Chair) and Floyd King (Local Arrangements Chair) for the 104th Conference.

The meeting was called to order at 7:19 p.m. by the Chair, John Clevenger.

John Clevenger announced that NSF representatives will attend the reception and banquet tomorrow, and conduct a special workshop on Saturday, immediately after the regular program.

Floyd King reported that 74 persons were already preregistered, and that all arrangements (exhibits, shuttle van, reception and banquet, etc.) were in order for tomorrow. Weldon Burnham commented on the program and announced minor changes.

It was moved by Edith Bartley, and seconded by Mike Knoll, that the minutes of the previous Executive Committee meetings at Kansas City be approved as presented in the agenda book (pgs. 3-7) - Approved by voice vote.

REPORTS

Ralph Burns commented on the Chair's 1988 Annual Report to DIVCHED, (pgs. 11-12 agenda book) summarizing our meetings and activities, including a percentage breakdown of $2YC_3$'s income and expenses.

John Clevenger reported that the 103rd Conference in Kansas City was a fantastic meeting with a very good attendance. The program was excellent and the meeting room was still packed at the very end of the conference. It is expected that the 105th Conference will be a good meeting.

Katherine Weissmann asked if we are doing anything for National Chemistry Week and suggested that we contact Jim Bradford for advice about a possible speaker, and transmit this information to the Program Chair of the October conference (106th). It was also suggested that we distribute copies of the ACS tabloid for National Chemistry Week at the Cerritos (105th) Conference. Leo Kling volunteered to carry out the above suggestions.

Membership (pg. 13 agenda book)

Mike Knoll reported ten additional members, bringing the total up to 508. In response to a question by Katherine Weissmann, he indicated that there are not too many renewals each year of people who joined by virtue of paying the registration fee when attending a conference.

College Sponsors and Treasurer (pgs. 15-17, 19-24 agenda book)

Duane Sell reported that we had 119 College Sponsors in 1988. For 1989 we have 106 so far. 1988 was a good year, financially, with increased income and decreased expenditures relative to the budget.

Industrial Sponsors (pg. 25 agenda book)

Leo Kling, reported that at the close of the last fiscal year for Industrial Sponsors (June 30, 1988) we had 32 sponsors. So far this year we have 23 paid up sponsors with possibilities for additional renewals.

Future Meeting Sites (pgs. 27-31 agenda book)

Elliott Greenberg reported two new conference sites added to the calendar--112th at Mays Landing, New Jersey, and 113th at Phoenix, Arizona. Updated information reported for the 107th, 108th and 120th conferences. Several additional sites, including one north of Miami, are under discussion. Jay Bardole suggested that, if possible, we try to hold our meetings in the Miami area at the same time as an ACS Spring meeting.

Joint Conferences with C₃

Edith Bartley presented a set of proposals for our joint meetings with C₃, including such items as registration fees, industrial sponsorship fees, seed money, mailing labels, finances, and liaison between the two organizations, etc. After much discussion there was general agreement with the concept that 2YC₃ should have a representative to serve as liaison with C₃, but selection of the liaison person was deferred. Considerable discussion also took place regarding reciprocity and frequency of joint meetings. It was generally agreed that joint meetings should alternate between the U.S. and Canada as hosts, but no final decision was reached concerning the frequency and timing of such meetings. However, there was some sentiment expressed that these joint meetings be held in odd numbered years since the DIVCHED Biennial meetings occur in even numbered years. There was also general agreement that when the U.S. is the host country, we should select a northern tier state as the site.

After modifications suggested by the Executive Committee, Edith Bartley was to forward the list of proposals to Alan Davis, C₃ President, for his consideration.

ACS Two-Year College Programs (pgs. 33-36 agenda book)

Terri Nally sent regrets at being unable to attend because of a simultaneous SOCED meeting. In response to a request by John Clevenger, Terri Nally submitted a memo summarizing the cost for printing and mailing the agenda books for our conferences.

Task Force

Jay Bardole reported that the Task Force held a pre x-mas meeting. There is a possibility of another report being issued which might be in the form of a supplement to the Guidelines.

Consultant Service

Kathy Weissmann reported that a proposal has been submitted to NSF for funds to train consultants to go to colleges that do not have minority status (funds). If the proposal is funded there is a possibility that 2YC₃ might be involved in training sessions. A question was raised, and some discussion ensued, about a long overdue report of a consultant's visit. There appears to be a problem in getting some reports back to the visited college in the appropriate time.

House Subcommittee on Science, Space & Technology

John Clevenger announced that he has been invited to give testimony before the House Subcommittee on Science, Space & Technology, on the subject of staff development and curriculum improvement.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

There is one nominee for the position of Chair-Elect. Two formal applications have been received for the position of Membership Chair. Ballots will be prepared and mailed out to the Executive Committee. Both offices will be on the same ballot.

OLD BUSINESS

NSF Undergraduate Faculty Enhancement Grant Proposal

Duane Sell reported on his NSF proposal for training two-year faculty in the use of modern laboratory instruments. He acknowledged Kathy Weissmann's suggestions and help in writing. All agreed it was an excellent proposal and complimented Duane on a fine job.

Publication of Newsletter for 1990

Elliott Greenberg submitted two cost estimates for printing the newsletter:

- 1. A commercial bid for a format similar to that printed in 1988 and 1989 (11" x 17" size folded sheet) with a colored masthead.
- 2. A proposal by Prairie State College for a simpler, 8½" x 11" size page format.

John Clevenger also submitted a proposal for format 1 above, to be printed and mailed by Truckee Meadows Community College. Terri Nally, ACS, declined to bid on publishing our newsletter for reasons of limited staff, and problems of budgetary and editorial control. A number of comments were made to the effect that the Newsletter is an important representation of 2YC₃, and we need to continue publishing a product similar to the excellent 1988 and 1989 issues. After much discussion, it was agreed to continue the present style and accept the commercial proposal presented by Elliott Greenberg. It is estimated that printing and mailing of four issues (12 pages per issue, 2500 copies per issue) will cost about \$3,500.

Passing It On: Continuation of Officers Duties

Duane Sell passed out copies of the Polices and Procedures to all present. It was pointed out that when an executive office changes hands it is necessary for the person leaving the office to turn over to his or her successor a complete set of pertinent written materials, procedures, correspondence, etc., as well as conduct an extensive briefing session or sessions with the new office holder.

2YC₃ Survey (Newsletter. Vol 89-I) (pgs. 39-43 agenda book)

John Clevenger commented on the results of the survey which are summarized in the agenda book. Unfortunately, responses to the survey were somewhat limited.

Greater Involvement of Entire COCTYC - Improvement of COCTYC Procedures, ETC. Kathy Weissmann distributed a 2YC₃ Organization Improvement Plan. Elliott Greenberg submitted some comments on things that we do well and things that need improvement. All

committee members were asked to submit their comments and suggestions about the activities and operation of COCTYC. At our next meeting we would then consider all of the above, together with the results of the survey, and attempt to correlate all the comments. It is hoped that we will be able to "distill" out of all this information some significant points of agreement on how we can improve the work and procedures of COCTYC.

It was also agreed, by voice approval, that we could "streamline" the Executive Committee meetings by relegating most regular committee reports to the Friday morning open COCTYC meeting. This should allow more time at the Executive Committee meetings for long-range planning issues.

NEW BUSINESS

Guidelines Survey (pg. 44 agenda book)

The recent issue of the Newsletter (Vol. 89-II) contains a survey about the Guidelines. Everyone is asked to complete the survey form and return it to Jay Bardole as soon as possible.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Ralph Burns, Immediate Past Chair of 2YC₃, is this year's National CMA Award Winner. The regional award winners were also announced. Dick Gaglione indicated the need for more applications for these awards.

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 10:48 p.m.

COMMITTEE ON CHEMISTRY IN THE TWO-YEAR COLLEGE 104TH CONFERENCE NORTH LAKE COLLEGE, IRVING, TEXAS FRIDAY, APRIL 7, 1989

ATTENDANCE

There were 59 persons in attendance at this meeting.

OPENING

John Clevenger, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 9:27 a.m. and introduced members of the Executive Committee.

He then reminded everyone that there was a 2YC₃ Survey in the Vol. 89-I Newsletter, and a Guidelines Survey in the Vol. 89-II Newsletter. Everyone was asked to respond to these surveys as soon as possible.

The National and Regional CMA Award Winners were announced.

MINUTES

Minutes of the Executive Committee (two sessions), and the COCTYC at the 103rd Conference in Kansas City, were approved as printed in the agenda book (see pgs. 3-7 and 9-10).

REPORTS

Annual Report (pages 11-12 agenda book)

Ralph Burns pointed out the percentage breakdown of 2YC3 income and expenses.

103rd Conference

John Clevenger noted that it was an excellent program and that the same theme could be repeated in other regions.

NSF Workshop

There will be a special NSF workshop on writing grant proposals, immediately after the last presentation on Saturday.

105th Conference

Ralph Burns pointed out that Dr. Paul Saltman, the banquet speaker, gives a very dynamic presentation, and encouraged all to attend.

106th Conference

Pat McCoy indicated that the special social event planned for this conference, a river boat cruise on the Ohio River including dinner and entertainment, has enough subscribers to "make it go" but requested that everyone make their reservations early.

Membership (pg 13 agenda book)

We have ten additional members, bringing the total up to 508.

Treasurer/College Sponsors (pgs. 15-17 and 19-24, agenda book)

Duane Sell reported 119 sponsors in 1988, and 106 paid up so far this year. He asked all present to be sure that their college renewed sponsorship this year.

Industrial Sponsors (pg. 25 agenda book)

Leo Kling has application forms and information sheets for prospective Industrial Sponsors. He asked everyone to solicit for sponsorship all firms they do business with that are not on our list of Industrial Sponsors. Please also stop by the booths of our Sponsors at this Conference. It is very important that we all visit the booths of our Sponsors if we are to retain these companies as Sponsors.

Future Conference Sites (pgs. 27-31 agenda book)

Elliott Greenberg noted two new conference sites (112th and 113th), and updated information for 107th, 108th and 120th conferences. He noted that we needed a site in the St. Paul - Minneapolis area on April 16-17, 1993, in conjunction with the ACS National Meeting, and requested help in finding volunteers to host this conference. Don Holman provided some names to contact at various community colleges in the area.

Office of College Chemistry (pgs. 33-36 agenda book)

John Clevenger reported for Terri Nally and pointed out the kinds of activities conducted by the Office of College Chemistry.

Guidelines

Kathy Weissmann noted that Jay Bardole is 2YC₃'s liaison person to the Task Force. Jay Bardole pointed out that these guidelines are suggestions of things that need to be done to have a chemistry department that functions well. There are now plans to put out an additional publication that indicates how to get help or information (sources) in fulfilling these guidelines. He also asked everyone to complete and return the survey on the Guidelines (Vol. 89-II Newsletter, pg. 5).

Consultant Service

Kathy Weissmann reported that a proposal has been submitted to NSF for funds to train additional consultants, produce consultant literature, and provide for consultant visits.

NSF Proposal

Duane Sell reported that he had submitted a grant proposal to NSF, on behalf of 2YC₃, to train 24 college teachers on four instruments. Following the daytime training sessions, the evenings would be devoted to developing a training manual and an original lab experiment.

OLD BUSINESS

A call was issued for nominations for Chair-Elect for 1991. Details are in the agenda book on page 37, as well as page 6 of the Vol. 89-II Newsletter.

NEW BUSINESS

John Clevenger reported on the survey (pages 39-43 agenda book). The purpose of the survey is to get feedback on what's good or bad about 2YC₃, how do we get people to become active in the organization, what makes people come to conferences, etc. It is an attempt to start a dialogue among the membership and get their feelings and input. Unfortunately, only 21 persons have sent in the survey forms so far. Everyone was asked to respond as soon as possible.

Molly Puckett indicated that she and Ann Cartwright were going to a forthcoming 2YC₃ local section meeting and would be happy to take along a supply of survey forms. John Clevenger indicated that if local organizations would inform him of their activities he would report it in our Newsletter.

A discussion followed concerning the desirability of holding conferences after the end of the academic year. A large number of persons indicated they would be in favor of this. Only a small number of persons indicated interest in a family program for spouses and children.

Kathy Weissmann indicated that we should have more small group discussions in our programs on topics of special interest.

A suggestion was also made to include on the program a tour of the host college's facilities.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

John Clevenger asked everyone to introduce themselves to their neighbors.

Edith Bartley announced that she was preparing a sign-up list for post-meeting social activities on Saturday night. She also described the features of the word processing package ChiWriter and offered to provide further information to all those interested.

Jody Chase announced that NSF staff members would conduct a special workshop on writing grant proposals, immediately after the last presentation on Saturday.

Elliott Greenberg announced the possibility of a chemistry staff position opening up at Prairie State College.

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 10:38 a.m.

GUIDELINES SURVEY PLEASE COPY AND DISTRIBUTE TO INDIVIDUAL FACULTY

Copies of the Guidelines for Chemistry and Technology Programs in Two-Year Colleges have been sent to all two-year colleges and several other target groups. These guidelines were developed by the ACS Society Committee on Education's Task Force on Two-Year Colleges established in 1983 with a four-part charge:

- 1. Revise the 1970 Guidelines for Chemistry in the Two-Year College to reflect the diversity of chemistry education responsibilities that have become the norm for individual two-year colleges in the past 15 years.
- 2. Develop an outreach and consultation program which would make the expertise of the Society staff membership more effectively available to two-year college administrators whose institutions are engaged in substantial efforts at improving the quality of their chemistry programs.
- 3. When the revised *Guidelines* have been published and the outreach and consultation

program is functioning, the ACS should undertake to certify/approve Chemical Technology programs in two-year colleges at the request of such institutions.

4. When recommendations 1,2, and 3 have been implemented, the ACS should undertake to certify/approve college transfer programs in two-year colleges at the request of such institutions.

Charges 1,2, and 3 are completed or are well underway. There has been considerable discussion regarding whether charge 4 should be implemented. The Task-Force is very interested in the distribution and use of the *Guidelines* and anxious to know how the question of implementation is perceived by the people most concerned. Your reaction to these questions would be extremely useful.
