COCTYC EXECUTIVE MEETING 106TH CONFERENCE HOLIDAY INN, LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY THURSDAY, OCTOBER 5, 1989

The meeting was called to order at 4:10 p.m. by the Chair-Elect, Elliott Greenberg.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF THE 105TH CONFERENCE

The minutes of the Executive Committee meeting held at La Mirada, California, were approved as presented in the agenda book (pgs. 3-5).

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

The Chair has received two applications for the position of Chair-Elect for 1991.

OLD BUSINESS

Biennial Conference

Leo Kling reported that plans to hold two 2YC₃ symposia at the Biennial Conference in Atlanta were progressing well. It was agreed to hold a 2YC₃ dinner and invite a speaker. Leo was warmly thanked for his efforts.

Advertisements in the Newsletter

Leo Kling reported that several companies were interested in placing advertisements in the 2YC₃ Newsletter. He suggested that the advertising occupy a maximum of 10 percent of the total space in a given newsletter. He also suggested the following guidelines.

- (1) Advertisers must be Industrial Sponsors.
- (2) Advertisements must be submitted in camera ready copy.
- (3) Advertisements must be only in black ink.

A discussion of fees ensued. It was decided to check with Truman Schwartz to see if there is an ACS policy prohibiting paid advertising in publications such as our newsletter before we discuss fee structures and develop guidelines for accepting advertisements. Leo agreed to do this. Terri Nally did not know of any obstacles, and supported the concept. Leo will head a committee to draft guidelines and recommend a fee structure.

Secretary-Editor

The need for, and also the duties and responsibilities of a Secretary-Editor were discussed. Most of the committee members present were in favor of establishing such a position. The question of funding another position was also discussed. Paid advertisements in the newsletter

could provide the revenue needed to add the position of Secretary-Editor. The term of office would most likely be for three years. A committee was established to examine the Polices and Procedures to determine how the duties of other officers, particularly those of Chair and Chair-Elect, would be effected by the addition of a Secretary-Editor. The members of this committee are John Clevenger, Elliott Greenberg, Mike Knoll, Margot Schumm and Kathy Weissmann. The committee will present a report at the 107th meeting. Leo Kling suggested that if funding is available, the position of Secretary-Editor be activated no later than January 1991.

Proceedings

As a service to those who cannot attend meetings, it was decided to reemphasize publication of the proceedings of the meetings in the Distillate. Terri Nally approved of the concept, but pointed out that the budget for the Distillate had been cut. There were only two issues in 1989. The Program Chair for the next meeting will be contacted and asked to obtain an abstract from each speaker. The standard ACS abstract form will be recommended.

Long Range Planning/Organizational Improvement

Kathy Weissmann started the discussion by raising several questions; what are the needs of two-year college chemistry faculty? how can we help to meet these needs? how can we best reach out to colleagues and new teachers? Duane Sell expressed deep concern at some of the comments made by reviewers of our rejected NSF grant application. It was felt that these reviewers did not understand the needs of two-year college faculty. It would help to have two-year college faculty involved in the review process. Ralph Burns pointed out that workshops on grant writing are being offered at the ACS national meetings and that some universities were thinking of offering such workshops. Elliott Greenberg announced that we are going to conduct a half-day workshop on writing grant proposals at the Boston, Massachusetts, conference next April. John Clevenger suggested that we run our own workshops to meet more of the specific needs of our members. The consensus was that we should consider scheduling such workshops during the summer when more people can take advantage of them.

Survey Results

John Clevenger reported on the most recent responses to the survey on the strengths, weaknesses and future directions of 2YC₃.

Future Conferences

Elliott Greenberg reported on the status of future conferences. Sites are still needed for Eastern Regional conferences in October 1991, the 115th, a second in May 1993, the 123rd, and a Western conference in April 1992, the 117th. The site for the 112th conference, April 1990, that was to be held at Roxbury Community College has to be changed. The new site may be Bunker Hill Community College,

NEW BUSINESS

Budget Matters

Duane Sell presented the preliminary annual budget for January 1 to December 31, 1990. He introduced a letter from Terri Nally, Office of Two Year College Chemistry, requesting funds from 2YC₃. She requested \$1000 to cover the expenses associated with producing, printing, and distributing the 2YC₃ agenda books, and a \$2500 matching grant to meet the projected \$5000 costs of printing and distributing supplementary materials for the "Guidelines for Chemistry and Chemical Technology Programs in Two-Year Colleges," for a total amount of \$3500. It was

approved that \$800 for the agenda books and \$1200 for the guidelines be appropriated in budget (calendar) year 1990, and \$1200 for the guidelines in the 1991 budget year. The budgetary impact of this expenditure was discussed. It was suggested and accepted that the amount allocated for the 2YC₃ Newsletter be cut from \$3800 to \$3000 to provide the additional money ACS was requesting. The budget will be revised and redistributed for further discussion at the next meeting in Gulfport, Mississippi.

2YC₃ Representation on ACS and other National Committees

Elliott Greenberg was disturbed because 2YC₃ had not been represented at the NSF Workshop on Science, Engineering and Mathematics. It is his view that 2YC₃ should be asked to recommend people from our organization to provide the two-year college chemistry perspective at such workshops. We should also be included in ACS and DIVCHED task forces that deal with two-year college chemistry issues. Jay Bardole and others felt this would come in time if we encouraged more two-year college faculty to serve on DIVCHED committees.

Committee Appointments

The terms of some members of the Committee on Chemistry in the Two Year College expire at the end of 1989. John Clevenger has contacted most of the affected individuals, most of whom agreed to continue to serve. There are a number of openings and the committee members in the regions where new committee members are needed will be asked to suggest qualified candidates.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:41 p.m.

ATTENDANCE

There were 30 persons in attendance at this meeting.

OPENING

John Clevenger, Chairperson, opened the meeting at 9:30 a.m. and introduced members of the Executive Committee.

Leo Kling and Duane Sell made a few comments promoting Industrial Sponsors and College Sponsors, respectively.

John Clevenger passed around the directory of two-year college faculty members, and asked everyone to update the listings therein.

MINUTES

Margot Schumm moved, and Leo Kling seconded the motion that the minutes of the previous meeting at Cerritos Community College be approved as presented in the agenda book. Approved by voice vote.

REPORTS

John Clevenger briefly noted the reports in the agenda book. He also commented on the portion of the program relating to writing proposals for grants from the National Science Foundation. Elliott Greenberg noted that there will be a half-day workshop on writing grant proposals at the Boston, MA conference in April 1990.

OLD BUSINESS

Survey

John Clevenger referred to the survey form on page 33 of the agenda book and indicated that this is part of an effort to determine how the organization can improve on what we are doing. He passed out survey forms and asked those who had not already done so to respond. There was some discussion of the factors affecting attendance at conferences, and what we need to do to attract those persons not attending. A show of hands indicated good interest (approximately a 60% majority) in a summer conference. It was noted that there were some new people here attending their first conference. It was suggested that the Newsletter contain an invitation for new faculty members to attend the conferences.

NEW BUSINESS

National Chemistry Week

Katherine Weissmann spoke about National Chemistry Week and displayed the kit that has been sent to local sections by the ACS. She briefly mentioned the promotional items in the kit.

Local Groups

The difficulty in travelling to conferences was mentioned, and it was noted that there were quite a few local groups around the country. Various people mentioned groups in Alabama, Michigan, Kansas, St. Louis, California, Illinois and New England. It was suggested that we try to collect information on these groups and publish a listing in the Newsletter.

Conference Proceedings

Leonard Grotz expressed a desire for the publication of conference proceedings. A very good show of hands indicated a strong sentiment for receiving abstracts of papers presented at conferences. This is to be done in the Distillate, and a renewed effort was suggested.

Attendance Incentives

Cullen Johnson inquired about the possibility of awarding incentives for attending conferences.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

NSF Support

Ted Reid suggested that NSF be contacted and asked for possible support of worthwhile projects.

Future Conferences

Duane Sell noted that the next Midwestern conference would be held at Elgin Community College, Elgin, Illinois, in October 1990, and urged all to attend

James Knight announced that next month's conference would be held at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College at Gulfport, Mississippi, on November 17 and 18.
