

Model Building for High School Chemistry Teachers: From Cubic Closest Packed Metals to Ionic Cubic Crystals

Workshops for high school chemistry teachers have provided experience in building models for both covalent and ionic structures. A set of models has been developed to show the relationship between cubic closest packed, face centered cubic and ionic cubic crystal structures.

Saving the Ozone Layer

Dr. Melvin D. Joesten

In 1974 F. Sherwood Rowland and M. Molina of the University of California, Irvine, proposed that chlorine atoms from the ultraviolet photodissociation of chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) in the stratosphere are destroying the ozone layer. This talk will review the scientific discoveries and diplomatic efforts that have occured since the Rowland-Molina hypotheses to bring us to the present global effort to ban the production of CFCs.

Representing Isomeric Structures (Poster Session)

A new method to help identify both constitutional and stereoisomers will be presented. By using arrows to point to unique sites on carbon skeletons, single structures represent more than one isomer.

Poems, cartoons and jokes convey the lighter side of chemistry. Each sample of this soon to be published collection can be used mnemonically to recall a chemistry fact.

Tour of Interactive Video Lab at PVCC

conducted by Lynn Lalko

This is a demonstration and hands-on session of computer controlled interactive videodisc instruction for chemistry lab and lecture. The networked system showcases the four volume Exploring Chemistry II videodisc series and the floppy disc based Introduction to General Chemistry and Organic Chemistry courseware. These programs were developed by Dr. Stanley Smith and Dr. Loretta Jones at the University of Illinois and have won EDUCOM/NCRIPTAL awards for the last four years.

The videodiscs in the Exploring Chemistry II series provide the student with full-color, full motion video combined with computer based text and graphics. The students can see the experiments exactly as they themselves would perform them without the normal safety, cost, feasibility, time or waste disposal concerns. The students can also work at their pace, repeating and reviewing material as necessary. The experimental observations can be immediately interpreted and analyzed with the aid of the computer. The system allows students access only to the lessons which have been assigned to them and records student progress in completing the experiments. The interactive video lessons when combined with conventional hands-on laboratory provides a learning environment which enhances and is superior (according to University of Illinois test results) to ordinary laboratory experience.

Call to Order

Elliott Greenberg, Chair, called the meeting to order at 4:00 P. M.

Approval of Minutes of the COCTYC Meeting, 108th Conference

The minutes of the COCTYC Committee meeting held at Elgin Community College in Elgin Illinois were approved as corrected; Leo Kling III's name was added to the list of those attending the meeting (see Agenda Book page 2).

Summary Report of the 112th Conference

Ed Zoranski reported that despite all of his efforts to publicize this meeting and get people to attend, only 36 people were registered. This was a grave disappointment to the conference planners. Ed identified a number of problems and offered suggestions for future conference planners, 1. low attendance, 2. very low early registration, 3. difficulty contacting exhibitors, 4. exhibitors left before the afternoon break, 5. program chairs must see to it that the meeting stays on schedule, and 6. program chairs should have a planned break, at least 15 minutes, in each session to give people an opportunity to visit the exhibit area. Ed pointed out that the list of items that have to be done in planning a meeting was very helpful, but one item was missing, the ACC planners did not know that they were to provide a social hour before the banquet. He suggested that this be added to the list. It was suggested that members of the Regional Advisory Committees be assigned to help conference planners with some of the details of conference planning, especially with publicity. They might also be asked to personally contact colleagues in their region to urge them to attend the meeting.

Personnel Matters

- 1. <u>Chair-elect 1992</u>: There was a discussion on the merits of each candidate. Ballots should be sent to Elliott in time to be counted at the Phoenix meeting.
- 2. <u>Industrial Sponsors Chair</u>: Patricia McCoy-Brown was elected to serve a three year term as Industrial Sponsors Chair.
- Assistant Industrial Sponsors Chair: Carol White will serve for three years as Assistant Industrial Sponsors Chair.
- 4. <u>Secretary/Editor</u>: There were no candidates. However, one person was interested in serving as editor. Dividing this position into two positions, Editor and Secretary, was discussed, but no definitive conclusion was reached. The question of whether the travel allowance provided was sufficient incentive to attract candidates for this(these) position(s) was raised. Discussion followed, but no definite conclusion was reached.
- Appointments to the 2YC₃ Regional Advisory Boards: Elliott has asked four individuals to serve as Regional Committee Chairs. To date, Ann Cartwright (Southern Region) and Alan Kruse (Western Region) have accepted.
- 6. Reappointment to COCTYC Executive Committee: The committee, especially the Chair-elect, was reminded that members of the COCTYC Committee (Membership, Treasurer/College Sponsors, Industrial and Assistant Industrial Sponsors Chair and Secretary/Editor or Editor and Secretary) must be asked if they wish to serve a second term eighteen months (July 1 of a given year) before the their terms expire. If so, ballots, asking for approval (or disapproval) are sent to COCTYC members. If the incumbent does not wish to serve a second term or, if the second term is not approved, the vacant position must then be advertised in both Fall newsletters.
- 7. Responsibilities of Regional Chairs and Committee members: Draft proposals describing the responsibilities of Regional Chairpersons and Regional Advisory Board members were discussed briefly.

Budget

The budget, found on page 4 of the Agenda Book, was unanimously approved without discussion.

Agenda Book

It was decided to continue to have Terri Nally's office publish the Agenda Book, but in a less expensive format. The funds saved will be used to expand the 2YC₃ Newsletter.

Report from the Membership Chair

Dick Jones reported that a packet of draft materials for discussion at the Phoenix meeting, will be sent to Committee members in early January. It was decided to expand the distribution of the Newsletter to include all officers of the Division of Chemical Education, staff and Congresspersons on committees with oversight of agencies that fund higher education as well as the Executive Committee of the Chemical Manufacturers Association.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 5:45 P. M.

1990 ANNUAL REPORT Elliott Greenberg, 1990 Chair

This report summarizes news information and conferences conducted by the Committee on Chemistry in the Two-Year College (COCTYC) during 1990. The COCTYC continues to be an active and vibrant committee of DIVCHED.

<u>Conferences</u>. Our main ongoing activity is the enhancement of chemical education and professional development for faculty through presentations and workshops at our conferences. The following conferences were held by 2YC₃ in 1990:

108th - April 20-21, 1990, Middlesex Community College, Bedford, MA 109th - June 14-17, 1990, held jointly with the 17th C₃ (College Chemistry Canada) at Capilano College, North Vancouver, BC

110th - August 5-9, 1990, held jointly with the 11th BCCE at Georgia Institute of Technology, Atlanta, GA

111th - October 5-6, 1990, Elgin Community College, Elgin, IL

112th - November 16-17, 1990, Atlantic Community College, Mays Landing, NJ

It is our continuing practice, every academic year, to hold one conference in each of the four regions of the country in order to facilitate attendance by two-year college faculty who generally have very limited travel funds. Attendance at the four regional conferences was nearly 500, which is a significant increase over the preceding year. Highlights of these conferences included workshops on grant writing, handling and disposal of laboratory chemicals, instrumentation, and instructional techniques.

At the 11th BCCE, 2YC₃ participated with a booth in the exhibit area, a program for two-year college faculty, and a banquet.

We are pleased to announce that ACS President Dr. S. Allen Heininger is scheduled to be the keynote speaker at the conference to be held at Anne Arundel Community College in Arnold, MD, Sept. 27-28, 1991.

Election Information. Ed Heath of Southwest Texas Junior College, Uvalde, TX, was elected to serve as Chair-Elect of the COCTYC for 1991, and will be Chairperson in 1992. Patricia McCoy-Brown of Jefferson Community College, Louisville, KY, was elected to a three-year term (1991-93) as Chairperson for Industrial Sponsors. Carol White of Athens Tech., Athens, GA, was elected to the newly created position of Assistant Industrial Sponsors Chairperson. She will serve a three-year term (1991-93), with responsibility for coordinating advertising in our newsletter. Ballots for Chair-Elect in 1992 have been mailed, and will be opened at the Phoenix, AZ conference.

Administrative Changes. In order to conform to the size and structure of other DIVCHED committees, nomenclature changes were effected whereby the former Executive Committee is now known as the COCTYC, and the approximately 60-70 members of the "Committee" will be referred to as the 2YC₃ Advisory Board, with regional designations.

Long-Range Planning. During the past year, a long-range planning program was initiated under the direction of Katherine Weissmann, a past chair of the COCTYC. In our third newsletter of 1991, we are planning to publish recommendations made by participants at the two meetings. The long-range planning process will continue, with consideration of all aspects of the COCTYC's operation, so that we can continue to serve two-year college faculty, and help them to meet the problems and challenges of chemical education in the 1990's.

Finances. A summary of expenditures for the year is given below:

It is important to note that, in accordance with long-standing policy, no COCTYC funds were used to pay any of the colleges or speakers for expenses incurred for our conferences.

We have again given financial support to the ACS Office of College Chemistry for distribution of the SOCED "Guidelines".

Continuing Activities. We continue to publish four editions of the 2YC₃ Newsletter each year, distributing over 2000 copies of each issue to members and to every two-year college. We encourage membership in DIVCHED and ACS, and participation in their programs and activities. Efforts are being made to increase the involvement of 2YC₃ members in the planning and execution of conferences, as well as the solicitation of new members and College and Industrial Sponsors. In order to maintain a continued high level of quality at our conferences, we continue to conduct informal workshops on conference planning to assist those persons involved in conducting future conferences.

Acknowledgement. A great deal is owed the many members who have worked so diligently in planning and conducting our conferences. We are also very grateful to the colleges that have so graciously hosted these meetings. Without the help of these individuals and colleges it would not be possible to conduct our extensive program of conferences.

2YC₃ Eastern Regional Advisory Board Meeting 112th Conference Atlantic Community College, Mays Landing, New Jersey Friday November 16, 1990

Attendance

Twenty names were listed on the attendance sheet. All attendees were 2YC3 members. Five were Regional Advisory Board members.

Opening -

The meeting was opened at 10:10 A. M. by the Chair, Elliott Greenberg.

Introductions

The COCTYC officers and past chairs that were present were introduced. Following that, all others introduced themselves.

Minutes

The minutes of the 111th meeting, held at Elgin Community College in Elgin Illinois, were approved by voice vote.

Reports

- 1. Elliott Greenberg presented a report on the 111th meeting. One hundred forty people attended the meeting, which was judged by all to have been a success. He also noted that there were gaps in the calendar of meetings and asked for volunteers to assist in obtaining sites for future meetings.
- 2. Richard Jones, Membership Chair, circulated a list of two-year Colleges ordered by state and asked that they be checked for accuracy.
- 3. Margot Schumm announced that ACS was combining several of its existing publications into one, <u>Chemunity News</u>. <u>Chemunity News</u> will serve educators at all levels, kindergarten through college. It is hoped that this approach will encourage communication among educators at all levels and thereby have a positive impact on teaching/learning of chemistry and science throughout the educational continuum.
- Elliot Greenberg reported on a meeting he and Estelle Gearon (Montgomery College, Takoma Park Campus) had with Luther Williams, Director, Directorate of Education and Human Resources of the National Science Foundation, on November 14th, 1990. As reported by Elliott, Dr. Williams acknowledged that there may be some inequity in the present system that works against applicants from two-year schools. He suggested that 1. there might be a separate competition among two-year colleges for some of the available grant money, and 2. 2YC2 send him guidelines that would help reviewers better understand the differences in the funding needs of two-year colleges and universities. Vera Zdravkovich (Prince George's College, Largo Maryland) volunteered to serve on a committee to develop a set of recommendations. Elliott urged that this report be prepared as soon as possible so that changes could be incorporated into the NSF Announcements that will be distributed in April, 1991. A discussion in which the following points were made followed: 1. Most reviewers are not acquainted with two-year college programs and problems. 2. Only 8% of all grants submitted are funded. 3. The new faculty enhancement program no longer requires matching funds. 4. Two year college faculty need to do a better job in telling reviewers who they are and what they do. 5. Two year college faculty must learn how to write successful grants. 6. Grantwriting workshops should continue to be held at all 2YC3 regional conferences. 7. Katherine Weissmann and Duane Sell can provide members with copies of grant applications that have met with success. and 8. Elliott has copies of the NSF announcements.

Adjournment

Elliott Greenberg thanked 2YC₃ members for the privilege of serving as their chair for 1990. On behalf of those assembled, Shri Iyengar thanked Elliott for his hard work on behalf of the organization. The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 A. M.
