## 2YC<sub>3</sub> Western Regional Advisory Board Meeting 113th Conference Phoenix College, Phoenix, Arizona Friday, March 1, 1991

#### **Attendance**

Seventeen names were listed on the attendance sheet. All attendees were 2YC<sub>3</sub> members. Eight were Regional Advisory Board members.

#### Opening

The meeting was opened at 9:00 a.m. by the Chair, Margot K. Schumm.

#### Introductions

The COCTYC officers and past chairs that were present were introduced. Following that, all others introduced themselves.

#### **Minutes**

The minutes of the 112th meeting, held at Atlantic Community College in Mays Landing, New Jersey were approved by voice vote.

#### Reports

- 1. Elliott Greenberg presented a report on the 112th Conference at Mays Landing, New Jersey. The attendance was lower than anticipated, however, the program was a great success.
- 2. Duane Sell was not present, but the Treasurer/College Sponsor's report was referenced in the agenda book.
- 3. Dick Jones, Membership Chair, said 2YC<sub>3</sub> has approximately 470 members, not including new members attending the Phoenix conference. Members that have not paid dues and were not present in Phoenix will be receiving dues notices in about two weeks. A spring questionnaire is going to be mailed to members in order to collect information regarding the community colleges and faculties.
- 4. Patricia McCoy-Brown, Industrial Sponsors Chair, reported there are currently 23 industrial sponsors. She requested adivsory board members to send her names of potential sponsors to add to the current list. Hosts for future meetings were also encouraged to consult with Pat regarding industrial exhibits.
- 5. Ed Heath, Chair-Elect, is in the process of talking to community colleges about hosting future meetings. The academic year 1993-94 is open and regional advisors are encouraged to make suggestions regarding future meeting hosts. Site-Selection Committee Members will be addressing the selection of future meeting sites shortly after the Atlanta meeting.

#### **Role and Function of Advisory Boards**

- 1. The executive committee has become the Committee on Chemistry in the Two Year College and what was previously the committee has become four regional advisory boards, each with a chairperson.
- 2. The COCTYC is in the process of developing responsibilities for the regional advisory board chairs and members.
- 3. The Western Adivsory Board discussed the role of the advisory board, in addition to the one meeting a year atttendance requirement.
  - a. They need to act as advocates among their colleagues, encouraging membership in 2YC<sub>3</sub>, and act as resource people to help provide potential speakers for future meetings in their region.

- b. Advisory board members can assist in finding sponsors that will be willing to help fund meetings, and perhaps assist two year college chemistry faculty with the expenses involved in attending meetings.
- c. They can also invite colleagues to share expenses in attending meetings, i.e., travel and hotel.
- d.. Tell colleagues how the advisory board members have benefited from meeting attendance in the past. Get the message out to the uncoverted.
- e. Encourage textbook authors to address meetings regarding their objectives in writing their textbook, and, maybe, give suggestions on how to use the book more effectively.
- f. The theme of the conference is important for attendance justificaion; <u>i.e.</u>, how will meeting attendance benefit the school and the students. The advisory board may be able to provide assistance in developing meeting themes. The theme should not be too restrictive; it can be monolithic, but there should be a variety of alternatives. Workshops can be a means of expanding a meeting's theme. A variety of workshops are planned for the Amarillo College meeting. In terms of continuing education, they are essential. In the past, successful meetings have increased attendance with several scheduled workshops, and have encouraged administrators' support of meeting attendance.
- g. Another function of the advisory board members is to make connections with high schools, junior highs, elementary schools, and universities, emphasizing the fact that science education and chemical education is a continuum. Community colleges are eminently suited to this process because we know how to deal with the non-traditional learner. We know how to deal with chemistry anxiety. Making those kinds of connections and being there to support these teachers, some of whom have had no chemistry and very little science, is a very good way to assess their needs and how we can address those needs, thus, making a step in the right direction toward supporting the entire educational community.
- 4. The Western Advisory Board also discussed the function of the officers.
  - a. They should help with future conferences.
  - b. They should encourage meeting organizers to attend meetings prior to their own, and discuss specifics regarding setting up and running a meeting.
  - c. Officers should encourage industrial sponsorships by speaking to companies that supply community and junior colleges.
  - d. They should act as clearinghouses for items that go into the newsletters.

#### **Public Relations**

- 1. Margot Schumm was recently a member of an academic team in which she was the only two-year college member. It soon became painfully clear that she and only she had to prove she knew what she was talking about. The high school teacher on the team was never questioned or put on the spot. We need to develop some mechanism for doing an in-depth study of community colleges, their faculty, their students, their programs, something that is sponsored by the American Chemical Society. The study should bring in sociologists from the ACS staff and:
  - a. Look at the role of community colleges in the educational continuum.
  - b. Develop a mechanism to encourage ACS participation.
  - c. Define what members want out of 2YC3.
  - d. Encourage the formation of local chemistry teacher organizations to facilitate the development of respect for what is being done in chemistry education at

all levels, i.e., Oregon and Kansas.

- e. Publicize innovative activities, from state to state, in ACS publications such as Chemunity. John Clevenger has agreed to act as our representative to Chemunity.
- f. Encourage participation in state community college organizations to facilitate such things as articulation. The state legislature in Ohio is becoming increasingly concerned about duplication of funding for courses being offered in community colleges and universities.
- g. Encourage follow up on what happens to students after leaving the community college; whom do we service and how are we serving them?
- h. Encourage American Association of Community and Junior Colleges and 2YC<sub>3</sub> interaction, perhaps to the extent of having an official liaison with AACJC.
- i. Support a study model, suggested by Bill Mooney, which includes a 4 by 3 model where data on four subject areas, curriculum, faculty, students, and resources would be collected in three phases, design a survey and collect data, analyze data, and publish results over a three year period. The data might be published as it comes along, concluding with a final publication summarizing the study and analysis.
- j. Support an annual slide presentation to AACJC by the 2YC<sub>3</sub> chair on the impact 2YC<sub>3</sub> is having on education in the community college.
- 2. The percentage of coverage for chemical education in *Chemical and Engineering News*, which is the newspaper of the chemical profession, is very slight. We need to provide the editorial staff with information concerning the good things happening in chemistry education so the people who are out there working and who are going to be hiring our graduates will know what we are trying to do. If good material is continuously submitted, eventually the editor will publish it. For a time there was a two-year college column in the *Journal of Chemical Education*, but it was discontinued due to a lack of articles being submitted. If we do not send in articles, we are not going to make the news.

## COCTYC Meeting 113th Conference Phoenix College, Phoenix, Arizona Saturday, March 2, 1991

#### Call to Order

Margot Schumm, Chair, called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

#### Approval of Minutes of COCTYC Meeting, 112th Conference

The minutes of the COCTYC Committee meeting held at Atlantic Community College, Mays Landing, New Jersey were approved as written.

#### **Summary Report of the 113th Conference**

Pay Moyer stated that the most annoying problem with the conference had to do with the industrial sponsors. John Weide had trouble getting a list of industrial sponsors to send letters to. The change of office (Industrial Sponsors Chair) led to unusual problems. Paul Elsner, chancellor of the Phoenix College System, donated \$1,500 to support the conference for items such as plaques, van rental, and other expenses. The absence of money worries was a significant contribution to the success of the conference. The old guidelines for soliciting industrial sponsors was not very helpful and need to be updated. Better response from the Industrial Sponsors Chair could also be helpful. Door prizes in the exhibit area were a good idea. Alan Kruse felt the conference planners were fortuante to get Henry Bent to balance content with classroom use of chemistry. This part of the progam was arranged 1 1/2 years in advance of the conference. Letters of thanks should be sent to the conference coordinators, the President of the college, and the Chancellor for donating the money. Alan Kruse and Pat Moyer will write Margot regarding "thank you" information. Conference evaluation sheets should be included in the next conference program, and for future conferences. John Weide also agreed to send Industrial Sponsor information to the next Exhibits Coordinator. Elliott Greenberg mentioned that Alan Heineger will be speaking at the Anne Arundel Confernece in Arnold, MD, September 27-29, 1991.

#### **Personnel Matters**

1. <u>Duties of COCTYC Members</u>: These duties need to be firmed up. Flow charts of responsibilities and deadlines for officers would be helpful, and may be developed after Atlanta. Dwaine and Lucy suggested it might be helpful to prepare a list of "essential activities to keep the committee running". Also, individuals designated with responsibilities resulting from action items during a committee meeting should receive a copy of the minutes and a reminder from the secretary. John Clevenger suggested a table of action items separate from the minutes would be helpful.

A secretary with a three year renewable term could effectively maintain a set of archives and provide continuity to the organization. It was decided to study the current set of responsibilities and discuss them at the Atlanta meeting. Elliott will take care of the details of sending a summary list of current COCTYC responsibilities to committee members before Atlanta, and members should be prepared to act on this item in Atlanta. Once the duties are defined a flowchart should be formatted and dispersed to all COCTYC members. All COCTYC members will receive a letter requesting their attendance at Atlanta. The

meeting will take place Thursday evening.

- Secretary: It was decided to send out a call for nominations for secretary in the next newsletter.
- 3. Counting of Ballots for the Chair-Elect and Treasurer of 1992: Elliott Greenberg will open the ballots April 8, and call Margot with the results.
- 4. Editor: Continue the search for a 3-year term editor, funded by, but not necessarily a member of COCTYC.

#### **NSF Grants**

- 1. The Dr. Luther S. Williams Letter: The letter was reviewed. It was recommended to make the letter more upbeat and Margot was asked to send the letter as personal correspondence under her college letterhead and not as 2YC<sub>3</sub> correspondence.
- 2. NSF Case Study: A motion was made and passed to ask for American Chemical Society Division of Chemical Education approval to forward the NSF Case Study as an ACS policy statement. Margot will call Keith Berry to ask for an action item on the Division agenda at the Atlanta meeting.
- 3. NSF Instrumentation Workshop: Dwaine recommended that 2YC3 pursue the instrumentation workshop proposal as a Division of Chemical Education proposal, using 2YC3 conferences as a means of workshop dissemination and evaluation.

#### **Public Relations**

Public relations will be placed on the next agenda.

#### **New Buisness**

John Clevenger offered COCTYC a place on the San Francisco meeting program for a day symposium focusing on a 2-year college topic, <u>i.e.</u>, "The Strengths of Two Year colleges".

#### Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.
