143rd TWO-YEAR COLLEGE CHEMISTRY CONFERENCE BUSINESS MEETING CENTRAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE, HASTINGS CAMPUS HASTINGS, NE NOVEMBER 14, 1998

The meeting was called to order by Richard Jones at 12:10 p.m. Due to the lateness of the hour, Dick requested that all reports be brief.

I. INTRODUCTIONS

- A. Richard Jones introduced the Officers and Past Chairs.
- B. All attendees introduced themselves and stated their school affiliation.

II. MINUTES FROM THE 142ND CONFERENCE, Central Community College, Hastings, NE

- A. The minutes are on page 2 of the 143rd Agenda Book. The minutes were approved as written.
- B. Richard Jones pointed out that information about the COCTYC members is found on the front page of the 143rd Agenda Book. Chair Emeriti are listed on page 43.

III. REPORTS

- A. Carol White presented the report on the Northampton Community College meeting on September 26-27,1997. She stated that the theme of the conference was "Chem Ed: Cutting Edge vs. Cutting Costs." Carol reported that the conference was well attended, and the speakers and tours were very interesting and informative. Mary Virginia Orna, Chair-Elect of DivCHED was the banquet speaker.
- B. Jeff Cramer presented the budget report which is printed on page 12 of the 143rd Agenda Book.
- C. Jeff also reported that the list of College Sponsors begins on page 13. 110 Sponsors are listed and Jeff has received several more renewals since the report was submitted. He encouraged everyone whose college was not already a Sponsor to consider becoming one. The College Sponsor form is on page 30. He also requested that those present check the information on their college and let him know of any needed corrections.
- D. Joanne Lin pointed out the membership report on page 31. As of October, there were 658 paid members. For those 2YC₃ members who are not members of DivCHED, there is now a discount on new memberships and the form is on page 32.
- E. Michaeleen Lee reported that there are 19 Industrial Sponsors and she encouraged everyone to help recruit new Sponsors among companies and businesses.

- F. John Kenkel reported on future sites. The conference calendar for the next several years is listed on page 34 with more detailed information about each conference on the following pages. John pointed out that the next conference will be held in Dallas on March 27-28, 1998, in conjunction with the national ACS meeting. He reminded everyone that the 15th Biennial Conference on Chemical Education will be held in Waterloo, Canada, on August 9-13, 1998. 2YC₃ is very much involved in this Biennial and will be hosting an ice cream social. Uni Susskind is the 2YC₃ contact person for this meeting. John encouraged everyone to review the calendar and make plans to attend future meetings.
- G. In Jay Bardole's absence, Dick Jones encouraged everyone to visit the 2YC₃ web site. The address is listed in the Newsletter.

III. ANNONCEMENTS AND NEW BUSINESS

- A. The 15th Biennial has already been discussed under Future Meeting Sites.
- B. Ann Cartwright reported that 2YC₃ has gained increased visibility with DivCHED through sending a liaison to their Executive Committee meetings and also by contributing articles to the *Journal of Chemical Education*. Ann encouraged everyone to look at these articles.

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 2:15 p.m. by Dick Jones at Central Community College.

I. ADDITIONS/DELETIONS TO AGENDA

Deletions: Dick suggested deleting item VE (Joint DivCHED dues) since it is the same as IVA.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES, 142nd CONFERENCE

Carol announced several typographical corrections to the minutes: II. Approval of minutes, 140th Conference, "Agenda Book" should be capitalized; C. Future Sites, "for the next few years" should be added to the last item; F. Membership, the word "be" should be inserted in the second sentence; Action Items, #19 the word "Assistant" is misspelled. Ann moved and John seconded that the minutes be approved as corrected. The motion carried.

III. REPORTS

Central Community College, Georgianna Whipple-Van Patter Α. Georgianna reported that the Industrial Sponsors form has not been changed to reflect that a school recruiting new sponsors receives some of the money. She suggested including a revised form in the conference planning book. Georgianna developed her own form and Michaeleen requested a copy. Tom is going to print up some copies of the planning guide. Michaeleen will get a form to Tom to include in the new printing. Two forms are needed, one for exhibitors for one conference only and one for sponsors who may exhibit at all of the meetings in a given year. Georgianna was disappointed that people did not stay for the Saturday afternoon program. She felt that the momentum went down hill after the first speaker did not show and there were technical difficulties with projecting one speaker's presentation. Georgianna suggested that conference mentors need to tell conference planners that speakers should get there early to make sure the setup will work. The committee agreed that the Friday sessions were great, and the food and accommodations were very good. Terri Nally complemented Georginna on an excellent conference

B. Personnel Matters, Dick Joanne Lin informed the COCTYC that her responsibilities have changed and, regrettably, she will resign her position as Membership Chair effective at the end of 1997. Joanne thanked the COCTYC for the opportunities that 2YC₃ has afforded her and she intends to remain as active as she can. She will submit receipts for her costs, including label preparation and student help. Dick Jones authorized the treasurer to reimburse her. The next newsletter should contain an announcement for Chair Elect 2000 and for Membership Chair. Jay Bardole and Carol White will work on these announcements. Jeff moved

that COCTYC appoint Dick Membership Chair for 1998 and John Kenkel will continue to serve as site coordinator. Ann seconded. The motion carried. Next, the appointment of the Assistant Industrial Sponsors Chair was discussed. Jeff moved and Ann seconded that Rudy Jones be offered the position. The motion carried. Dick Jones will contact Rudy Jones.

C. Future Sites, John

John reported that the 144th conference is well under way. The 145th conference has symposia organized and abstracts are being sent in. The ice cream social at the biennial will be held on Monday night. There will be a Tuesday noon luncheon and brainstorming session. There will be a newsletter covering the four 2YC₃ symposia. No business meeting will be planned since we probably will not have a COCTYC quorum. The Agenda Book was discussed and it was the general consensus that we will not need to have an Agenda Book for this biennial. Carol will contact Uni about the finances for the ice cream social. John has now added the names of conference mentors to the calendar. Terri Beam will be the mentor for East Los Angeles (148th conference). John has a preliminary program for the 146th conference. It was suggested that an hour and half be scheduled for an on-site lunch and the general membership meeting be held during this time. John will work with the conference planners on scheduling the business meeting. The dates for the 147th conference are Nov. 20-21, 1998. There may be a conflict with the ATE conference at NSF that will affect several of the committee members, but we will not change the dates. The ACS president will deliver the keynote address and/or the banquet speech. Wendell Massey is the program chair and he has someone to help with industrial sponsors. The theme of the conference is: "Technology, Textbooks, Teachers, and Topics: The Four T's of Teaching." He has several textbook authors as speakers and graduates employed with local industry to help with tours. Wendell has requested a mailing list for Florida and Dick will check on this. Dorothy Massey (Wendell's wife) is working on getting high school teachers continuing education credit for attending this meeting. Wendell is planning a boxed lunch on Friday and a catered barbecue on Saturday. The banquet will be held at a place on the river. A preliminary program will be ready at the Dallas meeting. Tom has contacted Carcy Chan, program chair for the 148th conference. For the 149th conference, we have

already moved to hold a joint meeting with the Canadians. They have located a site in Bellvue, Ontario. John has not gotten the dates from Dianne Ostogic for the 150th meeting in South Holland, IL. Dave is the mentor for the 151st meeting in Fort Smith and Thomas Clark is the program chair. The dates have not been finalized. John has already sent a conference planning book. The 152nd conference is scheduled for Las Vegas in conjunction with the national ACS meeting. The ACS meeting has not been officially moved. John contacted Kaveh Zarrabi and there will not be a problem with changing the dates if the ACS meeting is moved. There are three mid-western colleges who want to host conferences, including the University of Cincinnati School of Applied Sciences.

D. Budget, Jeff

Jeff gave out budget reports to everyone and there are three areas that are different from last year. CD interest has decreased. Conference mentoring expenses are different from last year since there are fewer meetings (change from 4*250 to 3*250). Newsletter ads need to be worked on to make the budget come into balance. Dick suggested we look into more revenue generating endeavors and not cut services. Industrial Sponsors were discussed. Georgianna wrote very nice letters, but no one came to exhibits. Local reps often do not get the message about meetings. Carol will include in the agenda for the Dallas meeting a discussion of how to get the names of the appropriate contact person. Jeff will change the budget to reflect 20 industrial sponsors. Ann suggested that we consider placing the Newsletter on the internet as a means of saving money. Carol will put discussion of a web-based Newsletter on the Dallas agenda. Tom suggested charging a registration fee for meetings and several members agreed that we should give this serious consideration. We could lower seed money or require that seed money be reimbursed. Terri suggested that we consider going through a transition if we begin charging registration fees.

The meeting was suspended and reconvened at the Holiday Inn at 4:10 p.m.

Jeff will change the budget to anticipate 700 members for the year. Dick tabled the budget discussion, which he will continue by E-mail. Wendell moved and Ann seconded that the budget be approved as amended. (Dave pointed out that there is a real problem with voting for a 10,000 deficit with only 10,000 in reserves.) The motion carried. Jeff passed out a sheet for Newsletter income statement and asked for suggestions. Jeff reported on the feasiblity of an annual audit. The audit done when Jeff assumed the treasurer's position cost \$200. It was a seven-year audit. Jeff knows someone who will do the audit for a lower cost. Jeff sends a statement to DivCHED and that may be sufficient. Jeff will contact DivCHED to determine if there is someone who will be able to do the audit for us and will report at the next meeting. Carol will put this on the agenda.

- E. College Sponsors, Jeff
 The Agenda Book lists 110 current college sponsors, but now the number is actually 117. **Jeff will work on a better arrangement for the list.**
- F. Membership, Joanne Joanne handed out an up-to-date membership report showing 683 members.
- G. Industrial Sponsors, Michaeleen
 There are 19 Industrial Sponsors listed in the Agenda Book, although all have
 not renewed and those will be removed by the next meeting. John asked about
 ACS books, but they are no longer a sponsor. John will check on CRC Press
 for Michaeleen and will request that they renew.
- H. Editor's Report, Jay
 The deadline for the next Newsletter is December 1. Dave expressed concern that our newsletters do not contain as much information as in the past. Dick will talk to Jay about including more content. John expressed concern that the web site is behind. Dick will work on finding a way to send Jay information so that he does not have to enter it. Ann said that perhaps being webmaster and newsletter editor is too much for one person. Terri suggested that we get two different people—one to do design and one to do content. Jay will see about getting the web page into a 2YC₃ URL, perhaps going through DivCHED.
- 1. DivCHED, Ann Ann is on the Nominations Committee. She sent Ron Archer and Pat Samuels a list of names, and she had also sent John Moore a list of 25 names. It is frustrating--the executive committee sessions are closed when nominations are considered, and nothing is written except the person's name and school. They do not know some of these people and it makes it difficult for them to be appointed to committees. Ann has asked Mary Virginia to write a column for the Journal of Chemical Education about how she is including 2YC3 in DivCHED. Next year is the 75th anniversary of the *Journal*, and they want us to do a poster at the biennial. Ann suggested we do something about 2YC3's column in the Journal. Dick will ask Jay about the history of the column. John said that two-vear people do not have much visibility and suggested we should invite twoyear people to come to the DivCHED meeting on Saturday. Dick feels that we could be doing more to increase our visibility. John Fortman was expecting something from 2YC₃ in pushing for the elections. The Exams Institute and Board of Publications are decided in the fall, the others are decided at the spring ACS meeting. Carol suggested two-year people getting onto DivCHED committees as a good way of increasing visibility before running for offices. John suggested publicizing the DivCHED dinners and activities at national meetings in our Newsletter. Diane Bunce is stepping down as member-at-large and Dick suggested that Ann should be nominated for this. Dick will contact

John Clevenger who is also on the nominating committee and ask about nominating Ann. John expressed concern about our officers leaving 2YC₃ meetings to go to the DivCHED Executive Committee meeting. The 2YC₃ chair and liaison already go to the DivCHED meeting and we need as many other officers as possible to remain at the 2YC₃ meeting. Jeff suggested going to the SOCED business meeting which is held on Tuesday afternoons during the national ACS meetings. It is an open meeting to report on the Executive Committee meeting from Saturday. We also need to write an article in our newsletter about what Ann has done for 2YC₃. Ann suggested really working on networking. She looks at the liaison position as a "mission" for a chance at raising respect for our profession and our students. ACS is a prestigious organization with lots of resources and a lot does not go to education. Terri agreed with Ann that this justifies leaving our 2YC₃ meeting.

IV. OLD BUSINESS

- A. 2YC₃/DivCHED dues structure for members, Dick Dick looked into the joint dues structure and in order to go beyond the first year, we would have to become a subdivision of DivCHED. We discussed becoming a subdivision years ago and there were some problems. It was not clear who would handle the budget and if possibly the COCTYC could be directly appointed by DivCHED, so the COCTYC decided not to pursue becoming a subdivision at that time. There was a proposal to change the by-laws so that affiliates could vote for all non-ACS officers. Dick will find out if this vote went through. It should be explained fully to our members in the Newsletter.
- B. Policies and Procedures Revision, Jay Item will be skipped since it does not need to be discussed.

V. NEW BUSINESS

- A. Selling/giving 2YC₃ membership lists
 Dick suggested adding to the E-mail discussion list. Carol will begin the discussion.
- B. URL Fees
 Dick suggested adding this to the E-mail discussion, as well.
- C. RAB advisory list Dick
 The last thing that the chair does before retiring is to work on the RAB list. The
 list starts on page 39, and there is no one scheduled to be rotated off the current
 list. Tom Gruber needs to be removed since he is the 1998 chair elect. We will
 not replace him at this time. Dick said that we do not really make use of the RAB
 and suggested that we get them involved more in the regional meeting. One of
 the past chairs could make conference planners aware of using the RAB so that
 they could send out at least one letter requesting help with planning and
 advertising. John suggested we add people now since so many will be rotating

off in the year 2000. John Clevenger's colleague, Eun-Woo Chang, was suggested. Ann will send Dick his address. Dick will contact Dale Buck in the Southern Region. Ann will send Dick information on Delores Aquino from her school. Bill Bornhorst was suggested from the Western Region. In the Mid-Western Region, Florence Waters-Chew has retired. Ann suggested Kelley from Minneapolis. Georgianna suggested John Fisher. Terri suggested Shree Ivangar from the Eastern Region, Vera Zradcovich (Ann wrote in the past and got no response), and Pat Cuniff. Dick will contact all of these people to add as many names as possible to the RAB.

- D. 15th Biennial 2YC₃ Business Meeting Dick The biennial has already been discussed under Future Sites.
- E. Joint DivCHED Dues Report deleted
 There was some additional discussion about the DivCHED liaison. We had discussed that every three years the immediate past chair would become the DivCHED liaison. Ann's term will be up at the end of 1998, but we do not want to lose Ann. We need a mechanism to utilize people who want to continue to be active. Dick suggested that we try to be creative about the budget and that we consider continuing to support Ann as much as possible. Dick thanked Joanne, Wendell, and Mary, who are going off the COCTYC, for their hard work.

VI. ADJOURNMENT Jeff moved and Ann seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried.

PC SOFTWARE

Survey the various types of tools available, including spreadsheets, presentation graphics, molecular modeling and drawing, simulations and the Internet. Become familiar with the capabilities of such tools through tutorials and extensive hands-on use in typical, chemistryrelated applications.

INFRARED (FTIR)

The basic principles of FT-IR are covered with discussion on the instrumentation, application and advantages over dispersive IR. Faculty obtain extensive spectrometer experience with hands-on practice in qualitative analysis of organic compounds and choices of experiments in general and inorganic chemistry depending on individual needs. Computerized data manipulations of the taken spectra will be covered. Additionally, reviews of the many IR databases, teaching videos and search routines that are available will be presented.

CHROMATOGRAPHY (GC, GC/MS and HPLC)

Experience high-resolution GC and GC/MS separations, and normal-phase, reverse-phase, and steric exclusion HPLC. The National Science Foundation (NSF) has funded a consortium of 2YC₃, three, two-year colleges and three, four-year colleges to offer a series of instrumentation workshops during the summers of 1998 and 1999. The primary purposes of the grant are to improve the knowledge of two-year college chemistry faculty in modern instrumentation and improve the competitiveness of two-year faculty in preparing NSF Improvement Laboratory Instruction (ILI) proposals. This project is a continuation and an expansion of an earlier project of 2YC₃, Sinclair Community College and the University of Dayton.

Two-year college participants will study the theory, applications and maintenance of an instrument in an intensive, hands-on, week-long workshop. The number of participants in each workshop is 6. Included will be a workshop on writing NSF ILI proposals. The workshops will be held at two sites: George Mason University in Virginia with Northern Virginia Community College and Western Washington University in Washington with Shoreline Community College. Each site will conduct the workshops at a different time and with unique instrumentation workshops.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Laboratory sessions will be held in the instructional labs of the various colleges. Participants attend one instrumentation workshop, and should indicate workshop preference on the registration form. Participants will also tour the state-of-the-art facilities at those institutions.

Travel, Housing and Meals

Information on accommodations, the daily schedule and special tours and events will be sent with confirmation of registration. Invited participants will receive additional information concerning the specific workshop they will be attending.

REQUIREMENTS

The Summer Instrument Institute is open to all two-year college chemistry teachers who:

- > Have at least five years of teaching experience in two-year college chemistry instruction
- Are responsible for at least one of the freshman general chemistry courses or sophomore courses offered at their campus
- > Agree to participate in the entire one-week institute
- > Hold at least a master's degree in chemistry or closely related field
- Have experience in using chemical instrumentation

An attempt will be made to include two-year faculty from each geographic region of the country. Women and minority faculty members are especially invited to apply. The tuition, room and board for two-year college chemistry faculty members is covered by the NSF grant while the institute participants are expected to pay their own travel expenses.
